

Priscilla's Promise

Priscilla's Promise was an evening of hors d'oeuvres, art and silent auctioning to raise awareness for cervical cancer screening.

The event, held at Timothy Michael Gallery in Roswell, was spearheaded by Mrs. Fulton County, Carrie Kelly, and Jay Ferro, widower of Priscilla Moore Ferro, the organization's namesake, who died of cervical cancer this year.

Paintings that hung in the gallery were paired with framed pictures of Priscilla, which were later given to her sons, ages 3, 7 and 9.

The silent auction included an Italian clay vase, a strand of freshwater pearls and sports memorabilia, including a football autographed by Herschel Walker and a baseball signed by Tom Glavine.

Sociable notables in attendance included Priscilla's widower, Jay Ferro; her parents, Jim and Jeanne Moore of Greenville, S.C.; her husband's parents, Jake and Michelle Ferro of Macon; and her sisters, Kelly Moore of Atlanta, Lisa Jackson of Alpharetta and Tina Forbes of Buford.

Also attending were ChoicePoint executive Bill Whitford, SparksGrove senior vice president and executive creative director Minsoo Pa and SparksGrove senior art director Adam Gray.

The evening raised more than \$5,000 for the nonprofit organization.
